Obituaries

Two of our longtime dear members have passed in the last month; Kari Poe and Bob Hippert. See their stories elsewhere in the newsletter.

Remembering Kari Poe

A faithful member of our lodge passed away January 3. Kari Poe joined our lodge in 2001 after moving to Loveland from Virginia. Kari will be remembered as a gracious and elegant hostess, always welcoming us into her home for many meetings, but especially for hosting Syttende Mai



eight times! Preparing for Syttende Mai took several weeks. All the silver and copper had to be polished, windows washed and flowers planted. On the dessert table was an Oslo Kringle. There wasn't a potluck meeting when Kari didn't bring her Oslo Kringle. "I've

made hundreds of these!" she once told me and "I host my lodge with pleasure".

Kari shared many stories with us all about her growing up in Oslo, meeting her husband on a boat returning from Copenhagen to Oslo, living an exciting military life and moving eighteen times!

In 2010, I interviewed Kari for a Cultural Skills project I was working on and she shared some memories with me.

Kari grew up in a home not far from Holmenkollen, the famous ski jump in Oslo. Her parents built the home and included a tennis court. Kari would walk or ski to school or take a street car with her two older brothers and friends. One day during the war, a German came to the door of their house and told them to move out and leave everything. Kari's family moved to an apartment building. The Germans built a two story building on the tennis court for a German officer...General Falkenhorst. Falkenhorst worked directly for Hitler and became commander of the German troops in Norway between 1940 and 1944.

While living in the apartment, Kari attended school in the basement of Ris Kirke (church). A German medical doctor lived in their house and several times he would invite Kari's family back to their house so they could see everything was in good condition and nothing was stolen.

Summers were spent on the island of Gaasøen in the Oslofjord. The children on the island would meet every day at the dock at 11 o'clock when a boat would bring the mail and passengers. The children brought packed lunches, and spent the afternoons swimming and playing. The furniture in the home was built especially for the house and the previous owners had an artist paint all the furniture. Every summer when Kari returned to Norway, she would spend time in this home now owned by a niece. Kari remarked that the house was just as pretty today as when they bought it in 1936 and the furniture never needed to be repainted. It was one of her favorite places and I'm sure brought back many fond memories.

Kari was married at Ris Kirke, the same church where she attended school during the occupation. After a year, Kari left Norway with her husband on the Oslofjord ship bound for America and their first home in Los Angeles.

In 2008, Kari and I were in Norway together and took the train from Oslo to Bergen and then a cruise on the Hurtigruten to the North Cape and Kirkenes. Kari loved seeing her homeland and enjoyed all the Norwegian food, especially the varieties of fish served on the ship.

Kari died peacefully in her lovely home and will be buried at Arlington National Cemetery, next to her husband, General Bryce Poe.

Tusen takk, Kari for all you did for our lodge. You'll be missed.

First Lodge Meeting



Kringel Recipe

Our beloved lodge member and friend, Kari Poe, always brought an Oslo Kringle to a pot luck meeting.

Here is her recipe:

Oslo Kringle (Norwegian pastry)



Kringle ingredients

1 stick butter

1 c. water

1 c. flour

4 eggs

Boil together the butter and water. Add flour in the same pan and stir. Allow mixture to cool slightly and add eggs

one at a time, mixing thoroughly after each egg.

Shape the mixture into a figure 8 on a cookie sheet. Bake at 425 degrees for 25 minutes.. Turn the oven off, and leave the Kringle in for another 15 minutes.

Icing ingredients

1 stick butter

1 lb powdered sugar

1 Tbsp almond extract

Coffee or milk

Slivered almonds

To make the icing, mix butter, sugar and almond extract together. Add coffee or milk to taste (Kari used coffee). Ice Kringle after it has cooled. Top with slivered almonds.

Robert Hippert

March 13, 1920 - December 22, 2012.



Robert Delacy Hippert. passed away, at the age of 92, at his daughters' home in Denton, MD. His beloved wife of 69 years, Helen Hippert, died in 2011.

Bob was raised in Cincinnati, graduated from Hughes HS in 1938, and

attended University of Cincinnati before joining the Army Air Corps. He served in WWII as a navigator on a B25 with the 11th Bomber Group stationed in India and China. He was awarded the Silver Star. Bob completed active duty in 1946, continued military service in the Air Force Reserve and retired as a Lt. Col. In 1968.

After completing active duty, he continued his education at UC, graduated in 1948 and attended graduate school at Syracuse University. He worked for Naval Intelligence/Targets in Washington, DC, Martin in Baltimore, Bunker Ramo in Canoga Park, CA and retired from the Federal Railroad Administration in Washington.

Bob and Helen retired to Santa Rosa, CA where Bob spent time studying real estate, viticulture and enology. In 1992 they returned to Cincinnati where Bob enjoyed taking and teaching classes at UC Lifetime Learning Institute, attending Hughes HS reunions and Sons of Norway. In retirement Bob and Helen traveled throughout the U.S. on Elderhostel trips and visiting family and friends.

Norwegian Goat Cheese Fire

About 27 tons of caramelized brown goat cheese, a Norwegian delicacy known as Brunost, recently caught fire as it was being transported through a tunnel near Tysfjord Norway.



According to the BBC, when the driver noticed that his cargo was on fire, he safely abandoned the burning truck about 1,000 feet from the tunnel's southern entrance. The tunnel and two miles of road were shut down as firefighters attempted to battle the blaze. Brunost isn't your typical cheese. Some might say it's more like sweet salty goat fudge. Packed full of sugar and fat, it is also a perfect fuel for a raging fire. The local fire department battled the tunnel fire for nearly five days. Their efforts were slowed by toxic gases and now the tunnel, which is reportedly badly damaged, is likely to remain closed for several weeks. No one was hurt in the incident.
