Rock) and camped there overnight. She learned two different dialects and had lots of help learning Norwegian (especially a 4-year old cousin of her host family who helped her pronounce things correctly). Peach invited several of her friends and their parents to attend this meeting, and those of us who were not able to attend really missed a special afternoon. Thank you Peach!
