Fy da is when you step IN it.

Facts (and fiction) from Nordic Mythology and Norwegian History

Birkebeinere (Birch Leggings) was the name given to a group of soldiers who have become legendary in Norwegian history. Technically they were not soldiers to begin with, but rather a group of people joined together in the time of Civil War in Norway (1130 -1240). This Civil War was a result of several pretenders to the Norwegian Crown. One of them was named

Eystein Meyla, and his followers were given the derogatory name of "Birkebeinere" – Birch Leggings to indicate how poor they were. They turned it around and adopted the name for themselves. The name Birch Leggings hinted in a not so subtle way to them being poor and not able to afford proper clothing, but had to wrap bark from birch trees around their legs.

I am not going to dwell too much into the Civil War this time. The background was unclear laws of succession to the Crown, and the two major factions rallied around their candidate.

What has made Birkebeinerne famous is the tale of how they rescued the young king by taking him from Lillehammer to Trondheim. Young king Haakon was only about two years old and a prime target for assassination by the other side. If he could be killed, the Birkebeiner side of the war would not have a royal candidate to rally around. A group of Birkebeinere wrapped the young king in warm clothes and carried him on skis across the mountains to Lillehammer. By doing so they saved his life, and he later became a very important ruler of Norway who contributed to the shaping of northern Europe in his time. King Haakon's capital was in Bergen, and his great hall (Haakonshallen) is still there and I am sure that most of you who have been to Bergen have seen it. King Haakon's rise to be the undisputed king of Norway is also the base of the play by Henrik Ibsen; The Pretenders (Kongsemnerne) from 1863.



The painting by Knut Bergslien has made this trip famous (see picture). This picture of two Birkebeinere carrying the young king is well know and reproduced on posters, jewelry, various souvenirs etc. Each year there is also a cross country (or should I say cross mountain) ski race called Birkebeiner-rennet. There is also an annual bicycle race from Trondheim to Oslo called Birkebeinerrittet. In the USA there are annual cross country skiing events honoring the Birkebeiner tradition.
