A Visit To Norway IL

Cleng Peerson, is known by many names including the father of Norwegian immigration, the Norwegian pathfinder, the Norwegian trail blazer, the Norwegian Daniel Boone, and the Peer Gynt of the prairies. In 1821 he was sent by Norwegian Quakers interested in emigrating to America. They provided the funds for him to find them a new home in America and in 1825 they arrived in New York on a type of ship called a sloop. The Norwegians who arrived on this ship came to be known as "sloopers" or "sloop folk" and their ship, the "Restauration," is often referred to as the "Norwegian Mayflower," for it marked the real beginning of Norwegian emigration to America. Dissatisfied with their new location, Cleng Peerson went scouting through Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin searching for a more climate friendly and farming friendly location than the slooper's first location in Kendall, New York. In 1834 Peerson brought a group of the original sloopers to the Fox River Valley of Illinois. Norway, Illinois became a departure point for many Norwegians who settled other parts of the Midwest and became known as the "mother settlement." A monument, dedicated in 1934, honors the community and its founder, Cleng Peerson (1783-1865).



Norway Store, Norway IL

A stop at the Norway Store is a step back in time! I stopped in a few years back on my way to Wisconsin because I was curious about the name. Little did I know the significance of this little unincorporated village. The owner of the store approached me as I was obviously not one of his usual customers. He is quite a character and his stories added to the delight of that store. Barrels of lutefisk were lined up. A delivery of fresh fish (in their original state) arrived to their "fish" room to be deboned and cut to the liking of their customers and for their many freezers full of everything you can think of. It is also an old-fashioned meat market, post office, gas station and more; a true general store. They also serve food.



Norway Museum, Norway IL

The **Norsk Museum** in Norway, Illinois, is full of items donated by local families in honor of their ancestors. Once an old Norwegian Lutheran Church, the museum building was purchased by the Sons of Norway Cleng Peerson Lodge in 1977 and is located behind the Norway Store.
